We have several upcoming training opportunities for parents of elementary, middle, and high school students as well as our Meet-Up Mondays and Walk It Out Wednesdays for our







Cracking the Behavior Code:

A Book Study for Educators on *The Behavior Code* by Jessica Minahan, M.Ed., BCBA

About the Author

Jessica Minahan is a licensed and board-certified behavior analyst (BCBA), author, special educator, and consultant to schools internationally. Since 2000 she has worked with students who struggle with mental health issues and challenging behavior in public school systems. She specializes in training staff and creating behavior intervention plans for students who demonstrate explosive and unsafe behavior. In *The Behavior Code*, she reveals a systematic approach for deciphering causes and patterns of difficult behaviors and how to match them with proven strategies for getting students back on track so they can learn effectively.

Facilitators: Crystal Grey-Hewett, Andra Burch and Tisha Melton Crystal Grey-Hewett is an FSU CARD consultant trained as social worker, who has worked with people on the spectrum, their families, and professionals for over 14 years. Audra Burch is an FSU CARD consultant trained as a speech-language pathologist who has guided individuals with challenging behaviors, including those with autism, for 18 years. Tisha Melton is a BCBA and before coming to FSU CARD as a consultant, worked as an educator and behavior analyst, serving students with challenging behaviors within the public schools.

Training Description

Target Audience: This training is for special and general education teachers, administrators, related service providers, and paraprofessionals.

This 6-week training series will provide educators with a forum to read *The Behavior Code*, learn about strategies to help with challenging behavior, and discuss ways to apply the concepts in their own classrooms. Topics include author Jessica Minahan's FAIR Plan system, anxiety-related behavior, oppositional behavior, withdrawn behavior, and problematic inappropriate behavior.

Training Objectives

- · Understand and apply the FAIR Plan system.
- Identify patterns and causes of challenging behavior.
- Match appropriate strategies to the type of challenging behavior exhibited.
- Apply concepts and strategies from The Behavior Code to their own classrooms.

Communication Corner

Increasing Communication Through Play

Did you know that play can be an important part of your child's development in communication? This is true for neurotypical and neurodivergent children. When looking at autism interventions, many therapies are based on social play and the development of social skills, language development, and communication



skills, as these are often challenging areas for autistic children (Gibson, et al., 2021). Play provides a diverse framework for addressing these areas of need in a natural and engagingly interactive way.

There are six main types of play (in order of development):

Exploratory play - Children explore objects and toys, rather than playing with them, teaching them about their world.

Cause-and-effect play - Children play with toys that need an action to get a result, teaching them that their actions have an effect and gives them control.

Toy play - Children learn how to use toys how they were intended, developing processing, creativity, and problem solving.

Constructive play - Children build and create with toys toward an end product, developing motor skills and problem solving.

Physical play - Children use their whole body to run, jump, etc., developing gross motor skills. **Pretend play**

(the most complex) - Children use their imagination in role playing scenarios, developing social and language skills.

To encourage communication in play in autistic children, it may help to know some possible challenges that can affect play skills. For example, understanding how to play with toys, limited interests or increased focus on objects, imitation difficulties, and coordination abilities may be impactful (Marcus Autism Center, n.d.).

When playing with your child, you can encourage communication by:

- Talking about the items you're using.
- •Providing choices for your child to play with.
- Observing their likes and following their lead.
- •Narrating what your child is doing while they play.
- •Showing your child how to play with specific items.
- Taking turns with toys/items.
- •Role-playing pretend situations or favorite stories.
- •Playing in different places with different people and friends.

So, take the time and play! Playing with your child with autism will not only help encourage communication and interaction, but it will help you learn about them to build a closer relationship together.

IEP Tips and FAQs

The school year will be here before we know it, and summer is a good time for parents to familiarize ourselves with what to expect at upcoming IEP meetings. Remember, your CARD consultant is a good resource for IEP meeting questions and support.

What should I expect at my child's IEP meeting?

There are different types of IEP meetings, and each has a different agenda.

All IEP meetings should begin with the following:

- -Introductions
- -Purpose of the meeting
- -Review of procedural safeguards
- -Excusals for anyone unable to attend (parent should be given notice before meeting)
- -Team member concerns

<u>Annual IEP</u> meetings occur each year before the IEP expiration date. At these meetings the team will discuss the student's goals, services, present levels of performance and accommodations.

At an <u>eligibility meeting</u> recent evaluations will be reviewed and eligibilities will be discussed. This may include adding new eligibilities or dismissing eligibilities that the student no longer qualifies for.

An <u>amendment IEP meeting</u> may be called at any time during the year to discuss other issues or possible changes to the IEP.

Any of the above types of meetings may be combined to discuss multiple topics/agendas.

Who are the participants at an IEP meeting?

The members of a student's IEP team are dictated by law. They include a regular education teacher, special education teacher, school system representative, evaluation interpreter, parent(s) and the student (as appropriate). If the student is age 14 or older, someone should be present to assist with transition planning. Any related services providers participating in the child's education should also be in attendance at annual IEP meetings and others as necessary. If the parents need the assistance of a translator or interpreter, the school district will typically be able to arrange for one to be present.

Parents may bring/invite anyone of their choosing to an IEP meeting.
