Gabe and The Underestimated City

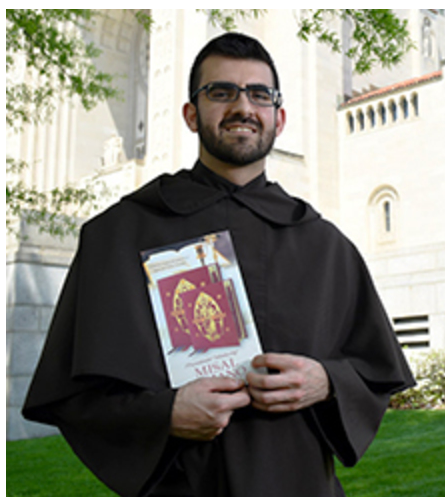

CARMELITE VALUES IN ACTION



Welcome Fr. Manu: Art and Service

Fr. Emanuel Franco-Gomez, known as Fr. Manu, joins the Salpointe community as our school chaplain. Fr. Manu is an artist and was ordained in his native Mexico in May. "Fr. Manu sees his art very much as a ministry," said Fr. Quinn Conners, O.Carm, director of formation in the Carmelite order, "so he's not just an artist who became a priest, but a priest who is an artist. He sees it as part of his evangelizing role through his art." Fr. Manu recently completed the illustrations for the first official Spanish-language missal for the Catholic Church in the U.S., which was published in May. Now, Fr. Manu brings his gifts to Salpointe. "God is calling me to

minister in that border, in between the two cultures," he said. "There is a great need in the U.S. to have ministers who can move from one side to the other. That's been part of my discernment, my spiritual journey." [Read more about Fr. Manu here.](#)

Fr. Manu recently visited theology classes to teach about the significance of the Carmelite Habit, described as the "Architecture of a Carmelite." [The Carmelite Habit](#) stems from medieval clothing and incorporates elements that reflect their humility and spirituality. The capuse, or hood, represents that Carmelites are traveling preachers and reminds Carmelites to submit joyfully to the will of the Lord. The scapular, or apron, symbolizes work and doing service for others. The Blessed Virgin Mary, Our Lady of Mt. Carmel, appeared to St. Simon Stock and blessed the habit, promising a special protection for those who wear the Carmelite scapular. "The work we do follows Mary's example of her dedication to her Son," said Fr. Manu, "and reminds us of our commitment to work towards the kingdom of God." The Salpointe community is looking forward to putting these values of service into action at the annual IMPACT service days in November.
