

Consular Office Hours

The Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago currently offers the following operating times for Consular Services:

- Consular Service windows will be open from Monday Friday 10:00am to 12:15pm and 1:15 to 3:00pm.
- The Consular Section's phones will be available to call between 9:15 am and 12:15pm, and again from 1:15 to 5:00pm.

We do ask that all visitors cooperate with following necessary precautions:

- If you are feeling ill, please wait to come in until you are feeling completely well again.
- In accordance with CDC guidelines, a maximum of 10 people will be allowed in the waiting room. Be aware that you may need to wait outside the waiting room should more than 10 people be present.




JFF+ Independent Cinema with the Japan Foundation, New York

THIS MONTH IN JAPAN



如月 (Kisaragi). February. Named after the winter cold and people wearing extra clothes. It was also called 衣更着 (Kisaragi), literally meaning "wear more clothes!"

There is a lot of snow in the northern part of Japan so I suggest you wear enough warm clothing if you are going there in Kisaragi.





There are a few significant days in February for Japan. February 3 is Setsubun, the last day of winter according to the Japanese lunar calendar. Popular amongst children, Sestubun is usually celebrated with children throwing roasted soybeans at a family member dressed as an Oni (demon) while chanting "Oni wa soto; fuku wa uchi." (Demons get out; good luck come in.)

National Foundation Day is February 11. This is the date that Jimmu, the first emperor of Japan, was enthroned as documented in the Nihon Shoki (Chronicles of Japan). February 23 is His Majesty the Emperor's birthday, a national holiday in Japan.
