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## **The Advocacy Program**



- The Advocacy program has four main elements:
  - 1. The Texas A&M Advocacy Network
  - 2. Aggies in Government
  - 3. Orange and Maroon Legislative Day (OMLD)
  - Aggies on the Hill
- Orange and Maroon Legislative Day (OMLD) brings together a statewide, grassroots network of alumni and friends of the University of Texas at Austin and Texas A&M University. These alumni work to increase public and legislative support for our two Tier 1 research universities.
- Aggies on the Hill is a biennial event in our nation's capital that promotes awareness and encourages federal support for Texas A&M University and higher education.



## So what is the Advocacy Network?



- A group of volunteers who are interested in politics and higher educationrelated issues that impact Texas A&M University.
  - These issues are the result of public policy or specific legislation enacted in Austin or Washington, D.C.
- Volunteers who are willing to receive information on a periodic basis from The Association related to the issues.
- Volunteers who will stay engaged with their local congressmen, state senators and representatives
- Opportunities to potentially participate in advocacy events in Austin and Washington, D.C.
- This is not an opportunity to visit with legislators to lobby for a personal or professional cause or issue.
