Winter Courses

Anth 409: Archaeology Lab Practicum

Instructor: Shelby Anderson

Tuesdays and Thursdays: 2-3:50pm

The goal of this course is to introduce students to archaeological lab processing methods and techniques through practical lab experience. The course is a mix of lecture, reading, lab instruction, and lab work, with an emphasis on hands-on learning and practice of skills. Students will engage in a variety of lab activities including sample cleaning, cataloging, photography, bulk sample sorting, radiocarbon sample preparation, and preliminary artifact analysis.





Anth 452/552: Lab Methods in Archaeology

Monday and Wednesday: 2-3:50pm

Instructor: Virginia Butler

This 4 credit course introduces students to the method and theory behind classification of archaeological remains and will focus on lithics--flaked and ground stone. Class will involve a mix of lecture, discussion and hands on analysis and classification of archaeological remains. Students will put their new knowledge to work by designing and carrying out a final analysis project. Given the quantitative nature of archaeological data, students will learn to use SPSS (Statistical Package for the Social Sciences) to complete assignments. The Lab Methods course satisfies the "methods" requirement for the anthropology major.

Students could take Lab Methods along with Anderson's Practicum (Anth 409, 4-cr.) and Living Technology: Stone Tools (Anth 399, 1 cr. Stueber). All will be valuable –especially for students seeking to pursue archaeology in cultural resources management or graduate school.



Anthropology 399: Living Technology- Stone Tools

Skilled flintknapper, Dan Stueber will teach a 1 credit course in winter quarter, designed to give students hands-on experience in the techniques of flintknapping; the production of stone tools. Cramer 41. Pass/No pass. For Majors and NonMajors.



Anthropology 414/514: Culture and Ecology

Tuesday and Thursday: 12:00-1:50pm

This course utilizes an anthropological perspective to understand the relationships between culture and ecology, with a focus on Indigenous knowledge and practice. We will explore frameworks for understanding Indigenous knowledge and case studies that address how this knowledge complements contemporary resource stewardship. Students will also develop and share a research project and have the opportunity to participate in a community engagement activity planned by the graduate students.



Anthropology 345: Practicing Anthropology

This course uses a practical approach to introduce the various careers that are currently available to practicing anthropologists and the skills required to obtain and sustain these jobs. 

Archaeology Field Methods in Alaska

The Adelphi University, Department of Anthropology welcomes applications for the 2019 summer field school in Alaska. Review of applications will begin immediately and continue until the course is full—so submit your application early.

This year, research will focus on the newly discovered Holzman site along Shaw Creek where multiple hearths, large mammal bones, stone tools, and a nearly complete mammoth tusk were found dating to the end of the Ice Age. Join our research team in the scenic Tanana Valley as we investigate the question, who were the First Alaskans?

Taught by experienced faculty with a student-instructor ratio among the lowest available (3:1), this program emphasizes a range of experiential learning opportunities. Already have a field school experience but looking for something more? You can also apply for an advanced program for graduate credit.
