Digital Collections

Over the past year, many digitized items have been added to <u>Duke's</u> <u>Digital Collections</u>, including additions to our digital history of medicine presence.

One such item is the <u>Journal of the</u> <u>V Corps, U. S. Army, 1864-1865 :</u> <u>various place in Virginia</u> by Dr. Charles Knickerbocker Winne, a surgeon in the Union Army of the U.S. Civil War. Dr. Winne's journal begins with the Battle of the Wilderness and includes daily records of casualties and movements of ambulance trains until the V Corps began its march back to Washington in May of 1865.



William Hollopeter papers, 1869-1930. William Clarence Hollopeter was born in Muncy, Pennsylvania, and worked as a physician in Philadelphia from 1877-1917. He specialized in pediatrics and hay fever. This collection includes correspondence, clippings, photographs, printed materials, financial materials, and other items elating to Hollopeter's work as a doctor.


A scarce text on the types of fevers, the use of quinine,




and more. The author studied medicine at Louvain and provides specific cases using clinical histories.

Menier, H.-M. Mon docteur : traité de médecine et d'hygiène méthodes scientifiques et populaires : allopathie, homéopathie, physiothérapie, médecine pratique, toxicologie, plantes médicinales Paris : Librairie commerciale, [1910].

This four-volume set targeted to a domestic audience mirrors other popular medicine encyclopedias of the late nineteenth and early twentieth centuries. The first three volumes include folded anatomical models with flaps, or layers, that lift to show internal anatomy.







Developing a Historical Biography and the Vital Importance of Black History Archives

In February, the History of Medicine Collections and John Hope Franklin Research Center co-hosted an event with author Blake Hill-Saya and C. Eileen Watts-Welch to discuss <u>Aaron McDuffie Moore: An</u> <u>African American Physician, Educator, and Founder</u> <u>of Durham's Black Wall Street</u> (2020).

Moore was one of the nation's most influential

African American leaders in the early 20th century and a co-founder of the North Carolina Mutual Life Insurance Company and Lincoln Hospital in Durham, NC. Hill-Saya and Watts-Welch are both descendants of Moore and this project had deep personal connections.
