PERSON OF THE MONTH: **RAYMOND JAMES**



Raymond has worked as a boat captain and fishing guide for [Adventure Guianas](#) and Piraiba Lodge for eight years, but he's been on the Essequibo River much longer than that. The 42-year-old father of four is a Makushi, one of the nine groups of Indigenous Peoples that inhabit Guyana. He grew up swimming, exploring and fishing the Essequibo, and has an exhaustive knowledge of the river. He enjoys his work and delights in helping visiting anglers turn their dreams into reality.

LANDING A BIG ONE IN GUYANA

With such a robust landscape of rivers and forests, it's not surprising that Guyana is one of the world's best places for freshwater fishing. There are close to 900 species of fish here, many of them on the bucket list of avid anglers, including the world's largest scaled freshwater fish, the arapaima.

These freshwater beasts can reach weights up to 700 pounds, and grow to over ten feet in length. In Guyana, most arapaima that are caught on the fly weigh between 100 and 200 pounds and average six to seven feet in length. Arapaima fishing here is strictly catch-and-release, but you'll never forget the thrill of reeling in one of these river monsters.



Other species you can fish for include payara, pacu, arowana, himara, golden dorado, piraiba/lau lau, a variety of catfish and several species of bass, including the peacock bass, a notoriously challenging game fish.

Primetime for a Guyana fishing adventure is November through January. And while February to May isn't ideal, an experienced guide will still be able to find some good places along the rivers.

With regards to accommodations, nature resorts, eco-lodges and community-run accommodation in villages close to rivers are the best choices for anglers. Un-fussy but comfortable, they're perfect for recuperating after a long day on the river. Here they can relax, enjoy local food and get an insight into traditional indigenous cultures and their ways of life. Some of the options to consider are [Karanambu Lodge](#); [Surama Eco-Lodge](#) along the Burro Burro River; [Rewa Eco-Lodge](#), the community-run accommodation at the confluence of the Rupununi and Rewa Rivers; and the [Arrowpoint Nature Resort](#) closer to the coast.

All of these (and other) lodges are accustomed to accommodating anglers and provide local indigenous guides with an in-depth knowledge of the rivers, the fish and the best spots for catching them. They can also provide the necessary fishing equipment.

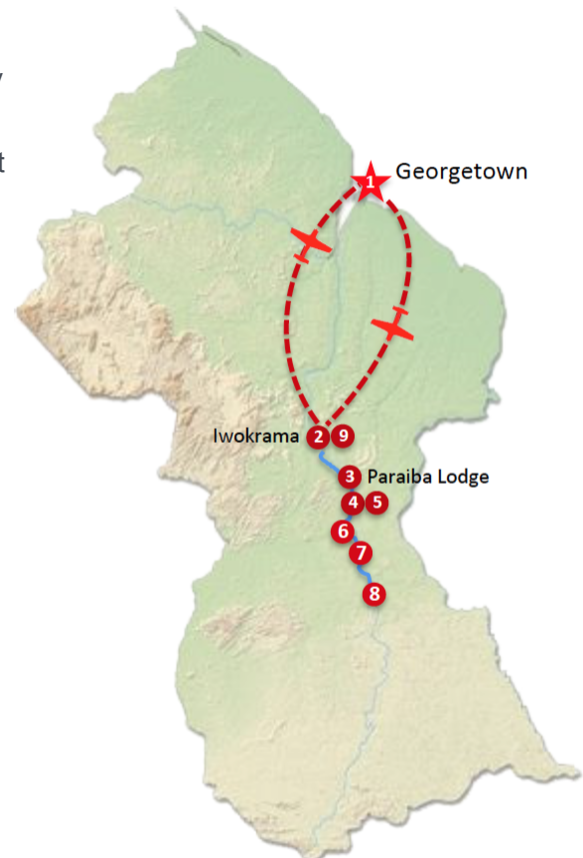

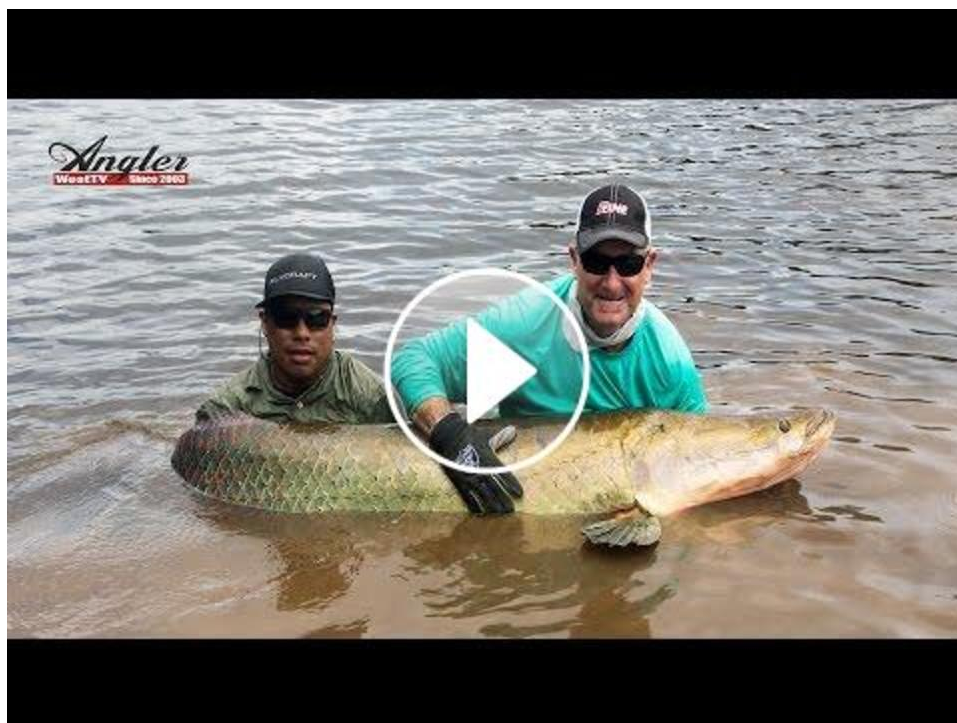
