

A Reflection from your Buddhist Chaplain

Love and death are the great gifts that are passed on to us that most of us leave unopened. --Rainer Maria Rilke

This week, our Buddhist sangha welcomes Lama Tsering Ngodup Yodsampa, to speak on death and the afterlife. We are also, together with the Humanist Community at Tufts (HCAT), hosting a Death Café. While these may sound like somber occasions, there is immense creative potential that opens up when we turn towards the truth of mortality and grief, however we can.

Great poets and artists, such as Rainer Maria Rilke, have made that choice, taken that journey-- have chosen light, by really looking at grief rather than staying in the dark of denial. Rilke willingly entered into that transformation, and it was creatively advantageous. Rilke experienced a breakthrough when writing Requiem for a Friend to process the death of his good friend Paula Becker, which propelled him to write the Duino Elegies and other masterpieces. This existential encounter served to facilitate his own artistic process, so that he was able to hold a mirror up to the mysteries of love and transformation which are uncovered through the human journey.

The programs that Tuft's Sangha offers this week present opportunities for small group discussion about the issues and questions surrounding the greatest journey. When we enter the conversation about death, we meet it as an ally, and learn how to live and love fearlessly in the here-and-now.

We hope you can join us Wednesday 7:00 p.m.- 8:30 pm in Goddard Chapel for the talk on Death and the Afterlife, or Friday 5:30 p.m. - 7:30 p.m. for the Death Café. All Tufts community members are welcome. If you're unable to attend, I invite you to savor a breath, a color, an exchange – anything – about being here, just as you are, right now.




Nominate a Senior for the Wendell Phillips Award Submit your names by Monday, December 11

The Wendell Phillips Award was established in 1896 and is given annually to a senior who demonstrates both marked ability as a speaker and a high sense of public responsibility. Selected by the Committee on Student Life, the winner is the one graduating senior invited to offer a speech as part of Commencement, and the speech takes place during the Baccalaureate Ceremony. The speech is intended to deliver a message about civic engagement in our time. Faculty, staff, and students may nominate seniors to apply for this honor, and seniors may self-nominate. 




Pride Shabbat

Friday, December 8, 5:30 p.m., Granoff Family Hillel Center



Advent

Sun., Dec. 3 - Sun., Dec 24., 2023

Tradition: Christianity-Protestant, Christianity-Roman Catholic

Period of four weeks in which Christians prepare for Christmas and meditate on the end of all time. In Western churches, the first Sunday of Advent marks the beginning of the Christian liturgical year.

Hanukkah

Thu., Dec. 7 - Fri., Dec. 13., 2023

Tradition: Judaism

The Feast of Lights (Feast of Dedication) is celebrated for eight days to commemorate the rededication of the Temple following the Jews' victory over occupying forces in 165 BCE, which re-established for a time their religious and political freedom.

Bodhi Day

Fri., Dec. 8., 2023 Tradition: Buddhism

In the northern tradition, this is the anniversary of the Buddha's Enlightenment, ca. 596 BCE. In the southern tradition, the Buddha's Enlightenment is celebrated during Wesak. The dates and names of Buddhist celebrations vary significantly among cultures and communities.

Feast of the Immaculate Conception

Fri., Dec. 8., 2023

Tradition: Christianity-Roman Catholic

A feast day that celebrates the belief that Mary, mother of Jesus, was born without sin.
