

PERSON OF THE MONTH: CARLA JAMES



The timing of Carla James' appointment to Director of the Guyana Tourism Authority was unprecedented, to say the least. Flashback to April of this year; Guyana's international airports were closed; indigenous eco-lodges and other businesses that rely on tourism saw their sources of income dry up virtually overnight; the entire world wrestled with the uncertainty of this new coronavirus, not knowing what lay ahead; and Carla took the reins at the GTA.

During the next nine months, she was part of the team of Guyanese officials working to provide guidance to the country's tourism stakeholders and

plan for a safe reopening of Guyana. Carla helped establish and implement protocols that allowed them to reopen in a safe and responsible manner and opened the lines of communication to ensure everyone in the local tourism sector were informed of the steps the GTA was taking and COVID-19 updates that affected them. In short, she rose to the occasion beyond what was ever envisioned. Now that international flights are once again arriving in Guyana and travelers are being welcomed back, Carla's commitment to ensuring a safe and sustainable tourism future for Guyana will guide her day-to-day activities in 2021. However, should the world throw her a curveball, as she has demonstrated, she'll be ready.

GUYANESE CUISINE: WELCOME BACK TO NATURE. WELCOME TO GUYANA.

It's been a long, uncertain year for international travel, but there is now more than just a glimmer of hope for the future. With a COVID-19 vaccine expected to be widely rolled out in 2021, a large number of people who have been quarantined, locked down or otherwise stuck will be aching to travel again.



There is arguably no more ideally suited destination for the post-COVID traveler than Guyana. Research indicates travelers will be looking to reconnect with nature and the great outdoors. With its vast swaths of rainforest, savannahs, rivers and mountains, Guyana offers nature lovers a rich buffet of enticing experiences. Some of the densest biodiversity on the planet, including 820 species of bird, is right here.

Post-pandemic travelers will want to avoid crowds. Again, Guyana can deliver. After leaving the capital city of Georgetown, and heading into the country's interior regions, it's



entirely possible to travel for days without ever seeing another person outside of your travel group or accommodation providers. Guyana's indigenous community-owned and managed eco-lodges have small capacities and are often composed of a series of free-standing units. Even a visit to the iconic Kaieteur Falls may find travelers having the entire site to themselves.

Active adventure will once again be in demand, and Guyana will once again help get adventure travelers' hearts racing. Hiking, trekking, horseback riding, 4WD safaris--even mountain climbing--are on the menu. And so are softer adventure activities such as birdwatching and exploring the vast and varied landscape of Guyanese cuisine.

And Guyana is once again ready to welcome international travelers. Guyana's international airports reopened to commercial flights on October 12. **Eastern Airlines**, **American Airlines**, **Caribbean Airlines**, and **Surinam Airways** are all currently offering service from the U.S. to Guyana. **JetBlue** recently launched its new nonstop service between New York (JFK) and Guyana (GEO). Flights will initially operate up to four times weekly. Caribbean Airlines is offering twice-weekly flights



between Toronto and Guyana with connections available from Trinidad and Barbados. <u>Trans</u> <u>Guyana Airways</u> is also offering service from Barbados and Suriname.

Travelers must obtain a molecular biological PCR test with a negative result within seven (7) days of travel and complete a passenger locator form to enable contact tracing at least 24 hours prior to travel. While travelers can visit most parts of the country, non-essential travel into or out of Region Seven (Cuyuni-Mazaruni) is still not yet permitted. 

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


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
