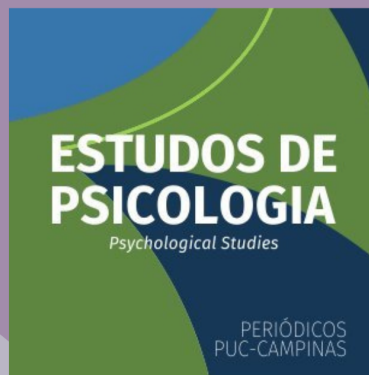

**Profile of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy Clinical Supervisors
Profile in Brazil**

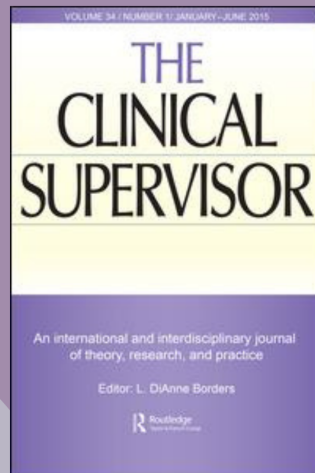
This research aimed to identify the profile of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy supervisors in Brazil and to know their training to exercise this professional activity. A nationwide online survey was conducted with 180 Cognitive Behavioral Therapy supervisors, 73.8% of whom were female, with a mean age of 40.3 years ($SD = 10.03$). Among the main results, the intense academic training, training for psychotherapeutic practice and time of clinical experience (12.6 years, $SD = 7.64$) and supervised experience (7.4 years, $SD = 7.26$) stand out. Only 27.8% of the participants indicated having received specific training for supervisors and there was a lack of indications of training resources for remote supervision. This is considered the first research to outline the profile of Cognitive Behavioral Therapy supervisors in Brazil, expanding the vision on this professional activity.

The Seven-Eyed Model of Supervision Practice

Many theoretical models have been developed to guide supervision practice (as many as 52 models identified in one review) but empirical studies of supervision models are rare. A popular model is the Seven-Eyed model (particularly in Ireland and the UK), and we carried out a six-month observational study with five supervisory dyads in an Irish, transdisciplinary youth mental health service to analyse practice through the seven lenses of this model. This study offered empirical support for the model's relevance for supervisory work, as well as elaborating and illustrating aspects of the model in practice. Some supervision dialogues were shared which contribute to our understanding of the complexity of working at the personal-professional boundary, particularly in workplace, transdisciplinary supervision involving dual roles. The Seven-Eyed model was also found to be valuable for identifying areas of supervisory work that needed development, indicating its usefulness in supervision training or metasupervision practice.
