GreenBlue and NSF International Announce Launch of the Public Comment Period for the RMS

GreenBlue in partnership with NSF International announces the launch of the public comment period for the Recycled Material Standard (RMS), which is due to be published in early 2021.

Once published, the RMS will be the only standard that offers both a mechanism for assuring claims of recycled content by corporations and creates a certificate trading system that directly incentivizes value chain participants to invest to grow recycling capability and capacity.

The public comment period will be open until December 18, 2020. Read the Standard here.
