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Dear friends,

It's hard to believe that March Break is finally upon us! I know many of our students, staff and families are looking forward to some downtime, fun and a break from all the routines of school. My family certainly is ready!

As you are likely aware, this week brought a major announcement from the Chief Medical Officer of Health in Ontario (CMOH), Dr. Kieran Moore, with respect to Covid. The detailed memorandum that followed for all Boards of Education included many changes to the risk mitigation measures in schools that help prevent the spread of Covid-19. These include the removal of cohorting, allowing for in-person assemblies, proms and graduations, and the wearing of masks becoming optional as of March 21st.

In my opinion, we are ready for many of these changes now -- including the removal of cohorts (especially outside!), and I am very pleased to see the go-ahead given for proms and in-person graduations. When it comes to masking, I am keenly aware that personal opinions vary tremendously on these becoming optional -- some never want to see a mask again, while others feel terrified at the thought of them not being required. Over the past two days, I have heard from countless parents, citizens and staff on this issue in particular and know that people have strong feelings on this issue.

At the TDSB, Trustees have always made every effort to ensure as safe and caring a learning environment as possible, as is our duty under the Education Act, while taking into account parent, community and stakeholder advice. While trustees are aware that we must implement the directives laid out by the CMOH, based on a variety of factors we considered last night, I put forward a motion asking the Minister of Education and Chief Medical Officer of Health to allow the TDSB a little bit more time to implement a phased-in approach to the changes outlined in the memorandum. The motion also asked for specific direction on masking requirements when working with medically-fragile students as this was absent from the directives. With March Break upon us, and many families and staff travelling outside the country, we know a 14 day federal masking requirement will be in effect for some, and it seemed prudent to ensure we took this into account,

as well to allow families and staff time to adjust to these new changes. Some of you are more than ready, while others need more time to understand and prepare. My hope is that the government will consider our measured and practical approach, and that Toronto Public Health can support us in this work with education and advice on implementation of the new directives, as they have throughout the pandemic. I am pleased to say that trustees voted overwhelmingly in favour of this motion, and we will hopefully have an answer from the Province by early to middle of next week. The Government of Ontario recently announced that all school boards must provide a Virtual Learning option for all elementary and secondary students for the 2022-23 school year.

While we expect a larger number of students to attend In-Person Learning next year, we recognize that some parents/caregivers and students will choose Virtual Learning to meet their needs.

With plans and staffing already underway for September, the Toronto District School Board (TDSB) is asking families interested in requesting Virtual Learning for the entire 2022-2023

school year to complete a [Virtual Learning Registration Form](#).

If your child will be attending school in-person next year, **no action is required**.

The [Virtual Learning Registration Form](#) is available online now and the deadline to complete is **Monday, March 21 at 11:59 p.m.** Please note, there will be no opportunity to switch in either direction between In-Person and Virtual Learning once the Registration Form closes.

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## Transportation Update: driver shortage and Annual Report



The student transportation providers continue to recruit and train drivers on an ongoing basis to maintain sufficient drivers for all routes. A driver shortage typically occurs when a driver is on a COVID-related self isolation leave as mandated by Toronto Public Health. This has forced the temporary cancellation of some bus routes for a period of up to 5 days (if the driver is asymptomatic for 24 hours before returning). To date, there have been relatively minimal service interruptions caused by these driver shortages.

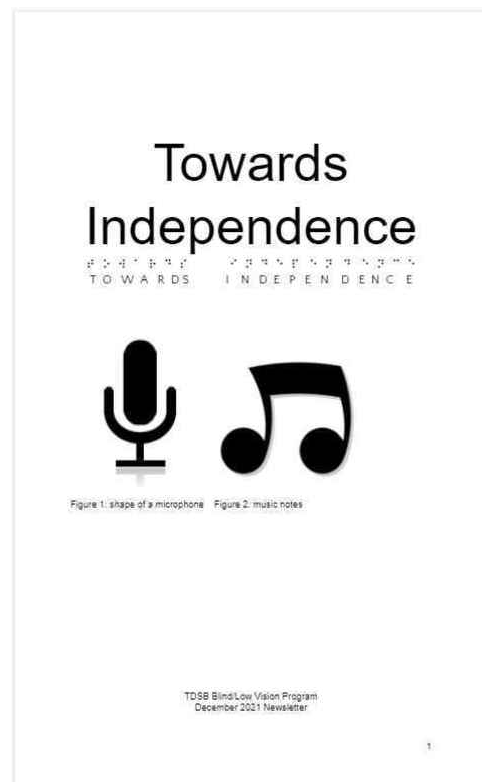
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## **Towards Independence Newsletter**

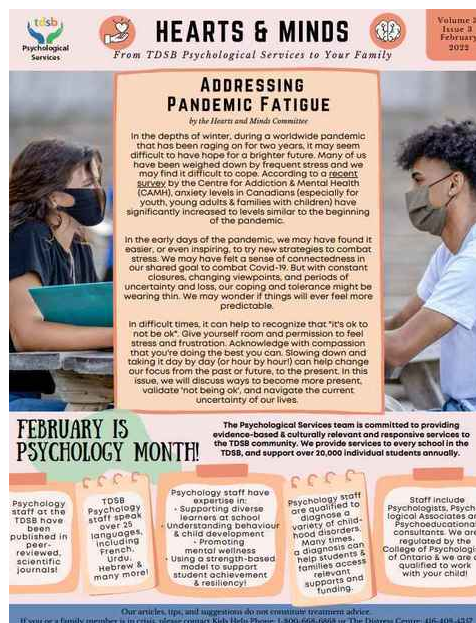

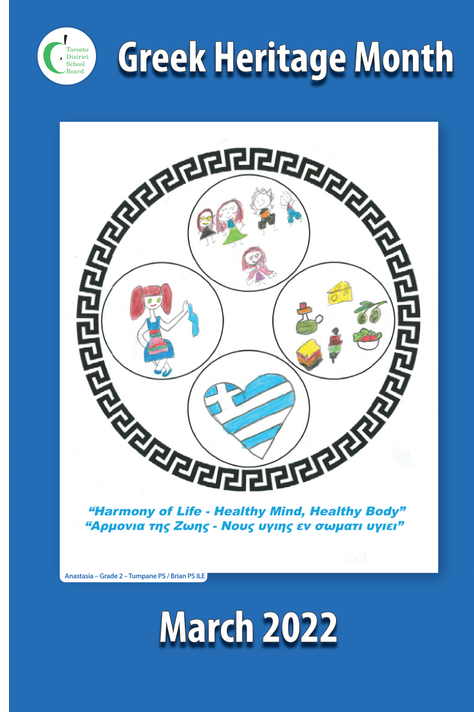


## March is Greek Heritage Month
