I recently learned that you were appointed to the [insert committee name], and wanted to extend to you my congratulations on this significant achievement.

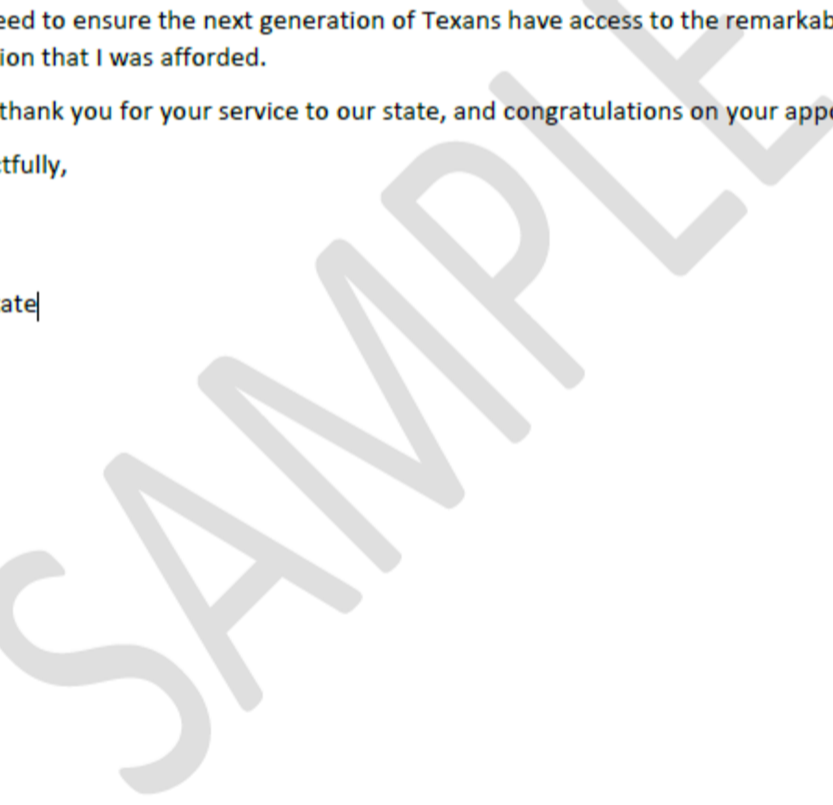
There are many important issues facing Texas this legislative session, and I know you and your colleagues will work tirelessly over the next several months to address them.
