Next week, President Michael K. Young will have the opportunity to testify before the Legislative Budget Board (LBB) and the Governor's staff in Austin. He will speak broadly about the flagship's legislative priorities and in particular about the University's Legislative Appropriations Request (LAR). During his address, President Young will outline specific budgetary requirements and inform the participants about how the University intends to spend the state's appropriations over the biennium. "I believe that in a representative democracy, those who serve in public office should do so for a time, not for a lifetime. And so I want you to know that my family and I have decided that I will not run for re-election next year," Straus said in a campaign email at the time.

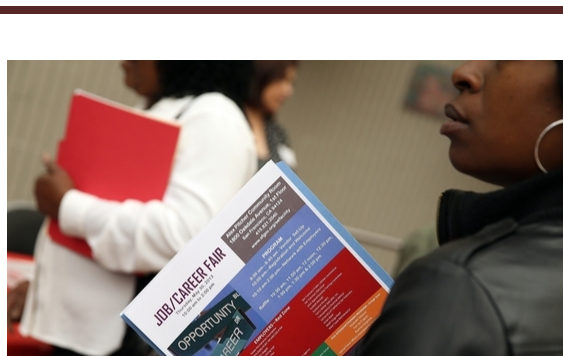
Wall Street Journal Reports: College Rankings

Colleges Say They Prepare Students for a Career, Not Just a First Job. Is That True?

About 60 percent of executives and hiring managers think that most college graduates are prepared to succeed in entry-level positions. But only a third of

executives, and a quarter of hiring managers, believe graduates have the skills and knowledge to advance or be promoted. Those findings — among the most striking in a new survey of employers released on by the Association of American Colleges & Universities — are open to several interpretations.

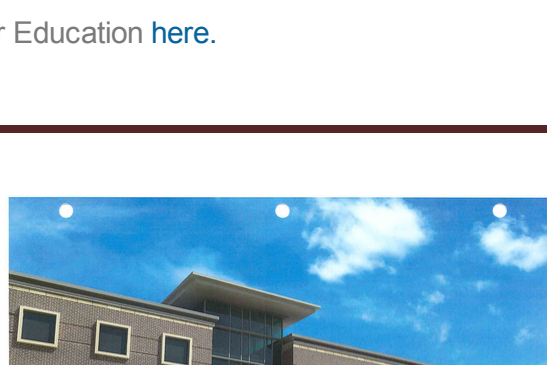
On the one hand, it's probably intuitive that graduates would be better poised for entry-level work than for advancement. No one has a second job until they've had a first one. On the other, colleges often argue that they're preparing students not merely for a first job, but for a lifetime of professional and broader success.

There's a new university in town.

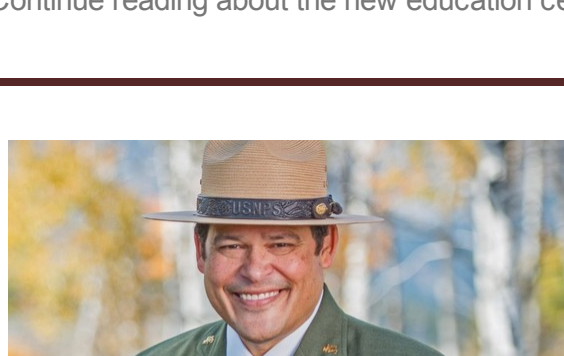
The Texas A&M University Higher Education Center has opened its doors to the school's first class of students.

Aggie Nominated To Head National Park Service

Texas A&M graduate David Vela '82 was named last week by President Donald Trump to head the National Park Service, a job that has been filled on an acting basis for the nearly 20 months since Trump has been in office.

Vela grew up in Wharton and graduated from A&M in 1982 with a recreation, park and tourism sciences degree. Vela, a 28-year career veteran of the park services, currently serves as the superintendent of Grand Teton National Park and the John D. Rockefeller Jr. Memorial Parkway that joins Grand Teton and Yellowstone national parks. He began his park services career at San Antonio's Missions National Historical Park.
