Update on CSRC Incorporation

The CSRC Executive Committee Members - Rod Goodyear, Mike Ellis, Karen Sewell, Ian MacFarlane, and DiAnne Borders - have been meeting weekly since last fall to file state and federal applications for nonprofit status, establish bylaws, create a policy manual, establish committees and committee charges, recruit volunteer committee leaders and members, and begin determining priorities for the next year. There's still more to be done in all these areas, but we are truly moving forward.

High on the list was a long overdue update of the [list of supervision measures](#) on the CSRC website. Two volunteers are starting to work on this project! We'll share updates in future newsletters.

CSRC Membership – Who we are, by member report

Membership continues to grow, currently standing at over 700 members. Who are we? Mike Ellis recently compiled some updated statistics.

Members reside in at least *32 countries*, including every continent except Antarctica.

In Case You Missed It...

From Australia: One in three midwives are considering leaving the profession. Well-run group clinical supervision, however, can meaningfully reduce workplace burnout among midwives, according to a [new study](#) (open access) from the University of Technology Sydney and other organizations. From the UK: A recent report called for more effective supervision of Designated Safeguarding Leads (DSLs) in UK schools, particularly around their high risk for vicarious trauma and burnout. DSLs carry the main responsibility for child protection and welfare in a school, including being a primary contact for a teacher, school staff member, parent, or others who have concerns about abuse, neglect, or other issues impacting the wellbeing of a student.
