News Updates

2026 Vermont Maple Summary

The USDA just released the National Agricultural Statistics Service on maple syrup production across the nation and here in Vermont. Below are the highlights

Total Production	3.091 million gallons syrup
Number of Taps	8.2 million
Yield per Tap	0.377 gallons syrup
2025 Revenue	\$102 million

- Vermont remains #1 in the U.S. and accounts for over 50% of national maple syrup production
- Consistent production across years, 2024 (3.1018), 2025 (3.009), 2026 (3.091) million gallons
- Growth in the number of taps from 2003 (2.1) to 2026 (8.2) million taps
- Improved yield per tap and average retail price per gallon
- Favorable, but variable weather conditions "fast and furious with intense but uneven sap runs"

Tree ID and Beech Leaf Disease Workshop

Thursday July 9 | 10:00 - 12:00 PM

UVM Research Forest, Jericho, VT

Join Dr. Jess Wikle, UVM Research Forests Manager, and Ginger Nickerson for a guided field walk in UVM's Research Forest.

We will learn to identify common Vermont trees and explore the introduced pests that affect them.

Along the way, we will see active infestations of beech leaf disease and emerald ash borer.

Help Find Lingering Ash for EAB Resistance

Friday July 24 | 10:00 - 12:00 PM

Missisquoi National Wildlife Refuge, Swanton, VT

The Ecological Research Institute, in collaboration with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service and Forest Pest First Detectors, will present a free field-based workshop on the Monitoring and Managing Ash (MaMA) protocols to look for and report "lingering ash."

You'll learn how to collect the needed data and how to incorporate lingering ash detection into ash management.

There will be an optional visit to a black ash site in the islands after the workshop.

Hear from Vermont's Forests, Parks, and Recreation on *Across the Fence* about opportunities to explore all 55 Vermont State Parks this summer, along with several updates to enhance your visit. Resource Updates

Help Complete Vermont's Protected Lands Map

The Vermont Protected Lands Database (VPLD) is a statewide resource that tracks conserved lands, but it is still missing important local data.

To help fill these gaps, the Agency of Natural Resources has launched an easy-to-use online mapping tool that allows towns and conservation organizations to review and update records.

Users can add missing conserved parcels or flag incorrect boundaries and information. Trainings and support are available to help participants get started and ensure their data is accurate. Your contributions will help create a more complete and reliable picture of Vermont's conserved lands.

Funding Available for Wood Heating

Vermont schools and municipalities can now apply for funding through the Advanced Wood Heating Assistance Program, which offers up to \$50,000 to support installation or upgrades to modern, efficient wood heating systems.

Funded by a USDA Forest Service grant, the program helps reduce reliance on fossil fuels while supporting Vermont's forest economy and keeping more energy dollars local. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis through the Department of Forests, Parks and Recreation.
