Niles Lehman (pictured below), a professor of Chemistry at PSU, has been selected as the 2018 Outstanding Oregon Scientist by the Oregon Academy of Sciences. As the 2018 Awardee Professor Lehman will be delivering the Keynote Address next year at the OAS Annual Meeting on February 23, 2019 at Linfield College.

Professor Lehman is being recognized for his groundbreaking research in molecular evolution and the possible origins of life.

PSU Announces the Transfers Finish Free Program

The new <u>Transfers Finish Free</u> program was announced recently, stating that it will cover standard tuition and mandatory fees for full-time transfers who are Oregon residents and meet the academic, financial aid, and eligibility requirements.

This comes on the heels of the success of PSU's other tuition initiative, Four Years Free, which covers tuition and fees for incoming freshman. PSU Helping to Create a Nationwide Research Center for Brain-Inspired Computing

PSU and seven other universities are forming a nationwide research center for brain-inspired computing, which will explore technologies to enable computers to do tasks that, as of now, are uniquely human.

PSU will receive \$1.4 million of the total \$27 million five-year grant, and engineering faculty Christof Teuscher and Dan Hammerstrom will head PSU's portion of the center.
