It's hard to believe that we are now into the final days of the 2021 school year. Last week, I had the pleasure of visiting two Ward 11 schools, Bedford Park and Sunnyview. Everywhere I turned, students and staff were hard at work, engaged in deep learning; students were smiling, laughing, empathetic,



contemplative, and questioning. It was a reminder and an example of the wonderful work being undertaken by our staff and our students, and a chance for me to meet and interact with administrators, students, and staff to learn more about what is working, and what we need to do to continuously improve as a school board.

As many of you are likely aware, last week our Board was tasked with considering a report from our Integrity Commissioner on whether a tweet by one of the TDSB trustees was a violation of the Trustees' Code of Conduct. Our Board rejected the report's finding. Following the vote, I moved a motion called Combating Hate and Promoting Understanding, and this was adopted unanimously by the Board. This motion was in direct response to many issues raised in the Integrity Commissioner's report, and provides a framework so that our Board can learn from the report and use it to focus on our work -- education. While the TDSB cannot solve all the problems in the world, it is important for us to create the best conditions possible for learning and discussion where students can develop into creative, innovative and compassionate critical thinkers and problem solvers, and it is my hope that this motion will help in that work. I encourage everyone to take a minute to read the comprehensive and powerful words of from our Director of Education, Colleen Russell-Rawlins, who spoke so eloquently on December 8th. As this is my last newsletter of the 2021 year, I do want to draw your attention to my next coffee morning, scheduled for the morning of January 12, 2022, by zoom. At that meeting, we will be holding elections for the Parent Involvement Advisry Committee (PIAC) and the French as a Second Language Advisory Committee (FSLCAC) representatives for our ward. Important: Winter Break preparation

As Covid-19 cases continue to rise in Toronto, so too unfortunately does the possibility of individual classes or schools moving to remote learning for a period of time.

While we have received <u>no indication</u> from either the Ministry of Education or public health officials about school closures in January, TDSB wants to make sure we are prepared to implement any decision they may make smoothly and efficiently and continue to support our students' learning and well-being.

Therefore, out of an abundance of caution and to ensure your family is prepared for any potential shift to remote learning, be sure your child brings home all of their personal belongings such as shoes or clothing, and any tools or supplies they might need to pivot to remote learning.

Also, ensure that the school has your correct email address(es) and bookmark the <u>Student Virtual Learning IT Support page</u>.

If you are travelling, please be mindfull of the established federal <u>international</u> <u>travel policies</u> – including the <u>guidelines for unvaccinated</u>, <u>school-aged children</u> – in advance, to prevent absences in January related to post-travel requirements. As of now, if the child/student is fully vaccinated they may be exempt from federal quarantine. If the child/student is not fully vaccinated, they are not to attend school/child care for 14 days, even if they traveled with a vaccinated companion. Please note that these policies may change, so please keep checking the <u>federal</u> <u>website</u> for the most up-to-date travel information.

By now your children should have brought home their box of Rapid Antigen Tests. Please make sure to read the letters about Covid precautions and how to use the tests (every 3-4 days over the break) from: <u>Toronto Public Health</u>, and the <u>Ministry</u> <u>of Health</u>. Today (Thursday), staff also received information about how to obtain a Rapid Antigen Test kit from TDSB to use over the holidays and prior to returning to work.

This newsletter has a lot of information, updates and notices about events, so please sit back, grab your favourite drink, and enjoy reading the many, many updates included below, including deadlines (like Middle French Immersion applications and switching learning models in Elementary schools).

Wishing everyone a wonderful holiday and a safe and happy New Year, and I look forward to reconnecting with you in 2022 (and especially at my first <u>Coffee</u> <u>Morning</u> of the New Year on January 12!).

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Elementary Switch Form (due January 7)

To switch between in-person and virtual learning for February 2022, parents/caregivers and students requesting a change must complete an Elementary Switch Form between Friday, December 3 and Friday, January 7.



A form must be completed for each student requesting a switch.

Parents/caregivers and students who do not wish to make a change do not need to complete a form.

If you are considering a switch, please speak with your child before submitting a Switch Form. We expect that parents/caregivers with shared decision-making responsibilities will come to an agreement before completing the form

We recognize that we are asking for this decision well in advance of February and thank you for your understanding, as this process takes time to complete. While we cannot guarantee that all switch requests will be met, it is our goal to accommodate as many as possible based on available programs and space (e.g. French Immersion, Extended French, Specialized Programs, Alternative Schools, other limited circumstances).

Elementary classes will reflect changes due to switches beginning on February 22, 2022.

Whether you choose a switch in learning model or not, your child's teacher or class (or school for virtual learning classes) may change due to a possible re-organization

Please note: Families with an older sibling currently enrolled in a French program and who will be in attendance next year are still required to complete an online application for the new student. Covid-19: Out of Province Travel Paused

The TDSB recognizes the importance of out-of-province travel both for professional learning purposes and student trips/competitions as a learning tool to enhance curriculum, student and staff learning and support student competitions. At the same time, we must also recognize that health and safety must always be prioritized as the pandemic continues. With that priority in mind, please find below our direction at this time:

Student Travel for School Trips/Competitions

All overnight trips for students are currently paused as a result of the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and on the advice of Toronto Public Health. While this remains in place, no out-of-province trips should begin being planned. We will formally reassess this pause in the new year and continue to monitor COVID-19 case numbers, Toronto Public Health advice and Government of Canada travel advisories should any adjustments be possible/required prior to that reassessment.

Staff Travel for Professional Learning

Currently, no out-of-province learning opportunities are being approved amid the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic. As the number of cases has continued to increase over recent weeks, we have made the decision to continue to maintain a moratorium on all out-of-province travel for professional learning. We will formally reassess this pause in the new year and continue to monitor COVID-19 case numbers, Toronto Public Health advice and Government of Canada travel advisories should any adjustments be possible/required prior to that reassessment.

TDSB Community Use of Schools Resumption Schedule

After weekend programming restarted earlier this Fall, the TDSB plans to resume community weekday evening permits on January 17th 2022.

To ensure we comply with the mandated COVID 19 requirements and the safety of all staff and students while maintaining fairness and equity in the allocation of spaces, we have put in the following conditions:

- Permits can start no earlier than 6 p.m. and end no later than 9 p.m. from Monday till Friday.
- Usage will be restricted to common areas such as gymnasiums, cafeterias, and auditoriums. No classrooms will be permitted at this time.
- Only one group per school per night will be accommodated. Schools with a pool or auditorium may have two groups providing the spaces being used are separated. For example, pools generally have a separate entrance, so the gym and pool could be used on the same night.
- Priority will be given to Not-for-profit groups serving children, youth, and seniors.
- All groups are expected to upload their COVID Vaccine Attestation Form at the end of each permit activity.
- We will be accommodating COVID 19 Vaccine Clinics and have informed permit groups that this might result in the disruption of their permits.


With the resumption of the weekday permits, this is the <u>updated TDSB Community Use of</u> <u>Schools Resumption schedule</u>.

The Board will continue to review this this decision based on new information received from both the Toronto Public Health Department and province.

Update on Implementation of COVID-19 Vaccination Procedure

Based on recent guidance from the <u>Ministry of Health</u> and the <u>National Advisory Committee</u> on <u>Immunization (NACI)</u>, Toronto Public Health is now updating its recommendation on the <u>optimal interval</u> between vaccine doses to eight weeks. As a result, the TDSB is also updating its timelines for staff who still need to have their vaccination. The date for employees who attested that they had received their first dose by November 19, is now midnight on January 21, 2022 to attest that they have received their second dose. Trustees with the Toronto District School Board have approved a \$5.9 million plan to support the mental health and well-being of students amid the ongoing pandemic.

During their Special Board Meeting this evening, Trustees unanimously approved the hiring of an additional 106 staff members following the release of a <u>report</u> earlier this week that highlighted the impact of the pandemic on student mental health and well-being. It supports implementation of the Ministry of Education's Policy/Program Memorandum (PPM) 166: Keeping Students Safe: Policy Framework for School Board Anti-Sex Trafficking Protocols.PPM 166 outlines school communities are key in building, supporting and providing culturally safe, nurturing, positive learning and working environments though the implementation of anti-sex trafficking programs and strategies, enhancing and creating partnerships with culturally responsive community partners and teaching students about healthy relationships.

This feedback will be used to inform the draft policy, which will then be presented to Trustees for review at the Governance and Policy Committee and submitted to Board. If approved by the Board of Trustees, it would be in place for the student application process for the 2022-23 school year.

Over the past week, the communication efforts to all stakeholders has drawn:

- 440 new unique visits to the Specialized Schools and Program Policy website last week,
- 106 new unique visits to the Policy Consultation website last week,
- 2643 people completing the online survey

Based on feedback from a meeting with Student Trustees, social media outreach has been expanded to include the TDSB Instagram account. This will encourage participation in the public consultation. Reminder e-mails were shared this week with all parents/guardians/ caregivers, students in grades 5 to 12, as well as TDSB staff to boost participation in the online survey before the December 17 deadline. We had the pleasure holding a consultation webinar with representatives from the Community Advisory Committees on December 7. Community affinity groups have been invited through our Community Support Workers to provide oral feedback at two meetings before December 17.

The online survey will remain open until December 17th.

Chair Brown also <u>wrote to various levels of government</u> to ask for funding support for the expansion.

This year's Winter Clothing Drive will run from October 2021 to the end of February 2022. Donations help provide warm winter coats, pants, hats, gloves and boots for our students.

Our need for winter outerwear is greater this year. Canada is welcoming newcomer families from Afghanistan and the TDSB is welcoming many of these newly arrived students into our schools. The newcomer students are adjusting to their first Canadian winter and need proper winter outerwear.




