



Consular Office Hours



The Consulate-General of Japan in Chicago currently offers the following operating times for Consular Services:

- Consular Service windows will be open from Monday - Friday 10:00am to 12:15pm and 1:15 to 3:00pm.

- The Consular Section's phones will be available to call between 9:15 am and

12:15pm, and again from 1:15 to 5:00pm.

We do ask that all visitors cooperate with following necessary precautions:

- If you are feeling ill, please wait to come in until you are feeling completely well again.

- In accordance with CDC guidelines, a maximum of 10 people will be allowed in the waiting room. Be aware that you may need to wait outside the waiting room should more than 10 people be present.

Reduction 8 with Tsukasa Taiko

Reduction is a theatrical response that brings back the foundational aesthetics of Japanese music with a pared down concert of music and dance. It is a performative statement that articulates the stoicism of musical and theatrical elements that are lost in the non-traditional rhythmic and sonic embellishments that appear in mainstream renditions of Japanese drumming. Minimal arrangements of original compositions and improvisation merge contemporary and classical philosophies of a fluid and complex musicality.


Consul-General Attends Sake and Friendship Event




Consul-General Visits Japan House at U of I

Langston Hughes Elementary School is one of the few elementary schools in Chicago that provides elementary school students with the opportunity to learn Japanese. She has been recognized for having continuously provided children at the school with opportunities to experience Japanese language and culture for many years, contributing to the promotion of Japanese language and the better understanding of Japan in the local community.
