Galan's presentation describes a landscape archaeology project that used GIS to examine the Battle of Alcala la Vieja, which took place 900 years ago near Madrid, Spain. The research used visibility, distances and optimal paths to gain insights on the military engagement. Results from the archaeological project contrast with written sources about the battle, highlighting the importance of using multiple lines of inquiry to explore the human past.

Introducing PSU CO-OP

Since launching the pilot this quarter, the CO-OP team has met with dozens of employers and received commitments from them to participate in CO-OP. Interesting CO-OP jobs are coming from <u>leading employers</u> in the Portland area, including software, manufacturing, and consumer product companies. Students approved for CO-OP will have an opportunity to apply for jobs with these companies starting in December 2018.

The majors involved in the first round of the CO-OP pilot program are from MCECS, CLAS, and SBA. Additional majors will be added in the coming year as we open up new CO-OP opportunities with businesses and organizations.

Program:

- -Every student interested in applying for the CO-OP course must submit an application of interest, where their eligibility will be determined by their academic department.
- -The eligible student completes a 1 credit hour course, before applying for CO-OP positions.
- -The successful applicant will then complete a CO-OP job for either 6-months as a full-time employee or 12-months as a part-time employee.
- -Once the student completes the CO-OP job, they will take a 1 credit hour completion course.

SOCIOLOGY 579/679: FOOD, JUSTICE, & SOCIAL MOVEMENTS

Winter 2019 Wednesdays, 2:00-5:00 pm Dr. Daniel Jaffee



This graduate seminar examines the vibrant and growing range of domestic and international social movements around food and agriculture. We begin by examining theoretical frameworks from sociology and other disciplines for understanding historical changes and current dynamics in the global food and agriculture system, including food regime theory. We examine the dominant global industrial food and agriculture system and its role in generating and/or heightening social inequalities. The course explores conflicts over the social and environmental impacts of the food system, including global food price crises, land grabs, land rights and access, agricultural labor, climate change, genetic engineering, and human health. We examine a range of social movement responses and alternative paradigms aimed at achieving greater social justice in food and agriculture in both the global South and the North, including fair trade, food sovereignty, seed sovereignty, and food justice.

Call to Volunteers: 2019 Point-in-Time Homeless Street Count

Multnomah County's bi-annual Point-in-Time Homeless Street Count is scheduled for **January 23-29, 2019.**


The Homeless Street Count is an effort to learn more about the individuals and families

experiencing homelessness in Portland/Multnomah County who are unsheltered. It captures a snapshot of those sleeping on the street on a given night (Jan 23). Communities that receive federal funding for homeless services are required to conduct a comprehensive Street Count at least every two years in order to maintain funding eligibility. The data collected from the count also helps Portland, Gresham, and Multnomah County plan for the funding and services needed to meet the needs of homeless persons in our community.

We need 90 volunteers in January to help make this happen. We are also hiring 10 team leads from the community to help support this massive and important data collection effort.

Volunteers will be stationed at specific locations throughout Multnomah County and work with agency staff to talk with people about the survey, invite them to participate, and then fill out the survey form.

What is the Street Count?

During the week of January 23-29, 2019 service agencies and outreach workers throughout Multnomah County will be conducting a survey to learn more about the individuals and families experiencing homelessness in our community. The Street Count gives a voice to people experiencing homelessness and helps to raise public awareness, makes our community eligibe to receive millions of dollars in federal funding for community-based services to help people exit life on the streets and prevent homelessness, and helps local governments and nonprofits better understand what housing and services are needed to meet the needs of people experiencing homelessness.

Himalayan Health Exchange

16th Annual Himalayan Anthropology Field Expedition

June 25-July 15, 2019

Himalayan Health Exchange (HHE) is organizing an anthropological field expedition to India in the summer of 2019. Through an independent study/fieldwork in a remote Himalayan Tibetan Borderland, HHE will offer students a practical approach to the study of India and the Himalayan culture in a socio-cultural, medical and religious context. During their journey, team members will attend a 7-day medical clinic camp and have the opportunity to investigate local history, religious beliefs and practices, modern human adaptations, regional effects of globalization and monastic life. In addition, through trekking and camping in remote areas, they will participate in the interconnectedness of the magnificent natural environment with a daily local existence. This first-hand experience will be accompanied by daily academic lectures and research assistance.

Lecture topics will include: Cultural, Medical and Visual Anthropology, Religion & Philosophy, Cross-cultural healing. Ayurveda, Public Health, Buddhism, Hinduism. Indian and Tibetan history, High Altitude Adaptation, Yoga and Meditation

Note:

This is a high-altitude expedition in rugged Trans Himalayan regions. Field camp elevations range between 8,000-13,000 feet, with higher pass crossings. As a participant, you must be in excellent physical shape and health and be willing to work in improvised field sites.

Locations

1) Himachal Pradesh: Spiti Valley & Dharamsala: June 25 - July 15, 2019

Once a part of the Guge Empire of Tibet, Spiti lies in the Indian Himalayar region at the edge of Western Tibetan Plateau. This anthropology expedition will take us on a fascinating journey through this beautiful and ancient Buddhist land, where travel was restricted until 1992, and where only a few adventurers have set foot. In addition to remote village exploration, the field trip will include, among many other destinations, a visit to Kibber, the highest permanent human settlement in the world; Tabo an ancient 10th century monastery and Dharamsala, home to His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama and Tibetans in Exile.

DANTA Tropical Biology and Conservation Field Courses in Costa Rica 2019

Primate Behavior and Conservation

Dates: June 5-July 1, 2019 Program Fee: \$3500

Application deadline: May 1, 2019

Course Description

This course is designed to provide students with field experience in primate behavior, ecology, and conservation. The course will be conducted at Osa Conservation's Piro Research Station in Costa Rica's spectacular Osa peninsula. As the one of the largest tracts of rain forest north of the Amazon (roughly 400,000 acres in the Osa Conservation Area), it is renowned for high species diversity. It is one of only a few sites in Costa Rica that contain 4 species of primate (mantled howler monkey, black-handed spider monkey, white-faced capuchin and squirrel monkey). Four species of sea turtle also nest along its beaches. Please help us protect this unique region which is of international conservation concern.

Enrollment is limited to 15 students. The course is open to both credit and non-credit seeking students. University credit can be arranged through your home institution.

Wildlife Conservation and Sustainability

Dates: December 28 - January 12, 2019

Program fee: \$2600

Application deadline: December 1, 2019

Course Description

The proximate and ultimate causes of declines of rain forest habitats and biodiversity will be examined through a combination of direct observations in the field, lectures, and critical reviews of the literature. Topics will include the role of hunting, logging, agriculture, disease, predation, expanding human populations and their consumption of natural resources as they affect forest and biodiversity conservation. Emphasis will be on sustainable solutions and how today's human societies can endure in the face of climate change, ecosystem degradation and resource limitations.

During the course participants will visit a wildlife rehabilitation center, sustainable chocolate plantation, and take a boat tour of the Golfo Dulce for dolphin viewing and snorkeling. We overnight on the Boruca Indigenous Reserve where we will learn about the community and their traditional lifeways, and help with needed projects. Every effort is made to implement eco-friendly and socially responsible practices into our day-to-day operations, field courses and overall mission.

Enrollment is limited to 15 students. The course is open to both credit and non-credit seeking students. University credit can be arranged through your home institution.



The list of the most important archaeological remains at Aigai is endless; the Palace of Phillip II is the biggest, most elaborated and sophisticated building of Classical Greece, the theatre, the sanctuaries of Eukleia and the Mother of the Gods, the city walls, the royal necropolis... over all, the unplundered tombs of Philip II, father of Alexander the Great and Alexander IV. Discovered in 1977-8 they made a worldwide sensation. The quality of the tombs themselves and their grave-goods places Aigai among the most important archaeological sites in Europe.
