## USGS ORWSC Brownbag Seminar with Loren Davis

We would like to invite you to the final installment of the USGS OWSC (U.S. Geological Survey, Oregon Water Science Center) fall brownbag seminar series on Tuesday, November 27th from 12 to 1 PM. Our speaker will be Dr. Loren Davis, professor of anthropology at Oregon State University. He will present "The Search for the Earliest Peoples of Oregon Above and Below Sea Level"

Archaeological research into the Pleistocene peopling of the Americas often begins as seeking answers to geoarchaeological questions: where are archaeologically-relevant deposits of the late Pleistocene held in the landscape, where are these deposits most accessible, and where is the evidence of early human occupation in these ancient landscape remnants most likely to have been preserved? In this talk, we will address these questions as they relate to



current research into the Pleistocene archaeology of the Willamette Valley and on Oregon's continental shelf.

# Uniting Worldviews to Advance Health in Indigenous Communities

Terry (Ha-ne-ga-noh), an enrolled member of the Seneca Nation, received his master's degree in social work from Portland State University in Portland, Oregon. He is the founding executive director of NICWA, now serving as senior advisor. He is the author of Positive Indian Parenting and co-authored Towards a Culturally Competent System of Care, published by Georgetown University. He has 40 years of experience in child welfare, including 10 years direct practice.

This seminar will examine the intersection between the linear worldview of Western medicine and the relational worldview of Indigenous populations and suggest a strategy for uniting these worldviews for a dynamic and powerful approach to resolving difficult health disparities.

# Himalayan Health Exchange 16th Annual Himalayan Anthropology Field Expedition 2019

June 25-July 15, 2019

Himalayan Health Exchange (HHE) is organizing an anthropological field expedition to India in

the summer of 2019. Through an independent study/fieldwork in a remote Himalayan Tibetan Borderland, HHE will offer students a practical approach to the study of India and the Himalayan culture in a socio-cultural, medical and religious context. During their journey, team members will attend a 7-day medical clinic camp and have the opportunity to investigate local history, religious beliefs and practices, modern human adaptations, regional effects of globalization and monastic life. In addition, through trekking and camping in remote areas, they will participate in the interconnectedness of the magnificent natural environment with a daily local existence. This first-hand experience will be accompanied by daily academic lectures and research assistance.

Lecture topics will include: *Cultural, Medical and Visual Anthropology, Religion & Philosophy, Cross-cultural healing, Ayurveda, Public Health, Buddhism, Hinduism, Indian and Tibetan history, High Altitude Adaptation, Yoga and Meditation* 

#### Locations

#### 1) Himachal Pradesh: Spiti Valley & Dharamsala: June 25 - July 15, 2019

Once a part of the Guge Empire of Tibet, Spiti lies in the Indian Himalayan region at the edge of Western Tibetan Plateau. This anthropology expedition will take us on a fascinating journey through this beautiful and ancient Buddhist land, where travel was restricted until 1992, and where only a few adventurers have set foot. In addition to remote village exploration, the field trip will include, among many other destinations, a visit to Kibber, the highest permanent human settlement in the world; Tabo an ancient 10th century monastery and Dharamsala, home to His Holiness the 14th Dalai Lama and Tibetans in Exile.

#### Workshop for Surveying and 3D Archaeological Documentation


When: 18 May - 1 June, 2019

Ø Affordable: \$15,000 for the M.A. degree and \$6,000 for the 12-credit Graduate Certificate – students can transfer in credits to save even more.

Ø Students study cutting-edge issues through frequent webinars and the online participation of human rights practitioners from around the globe.

Ø Curriculum includes unique online experiences such as virtual field trips, analyses of current human rights crises with guest appearances of actors on the ground, and community-engaged projects. Recent classes have focused on migration from Central America to the U.S. and from West Africa to Europe; the Rohingya refugee crisis; the Syrian war and displaced peoples; freedom movements in Africa; and using documentary media to advance human rights. Spring class topics will include: an overview of human rights practices; NGO practices—management, governance, accountability, and activities; violence against women and the @metoo movement in India; strategic litigation; and cutting edge issues in human rights--decolonization.
