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INT 380: Sustainable Democracy

Offered in Fall 2023, INT 380: Sustainable Democracy examines the abstract dimensions of democracy, its historical and current iterations, and explores global movements toward democracy. Emphasis will be placed on the processes of democratic participation, the role of a free press and informed public, and how students can participate in self-government on campus, locally, and globally. The course is approved as an elective for the Human Rights minor and the Civic Change Agent microcredential.

The course includes guest lecturers from the Departments of Communications and Area and Global Studies and will feature a field trip to the Ottawa County Clerk's Office, where students will meet with Clerk Justin Roebuck. In collaboration with the GVSU Libraries, a workshop on information literacy will be facilitated by librarian Amber Dierking. The term project for the course will be developed, performed, and assessed by students with criteria democratically determined by the class.
