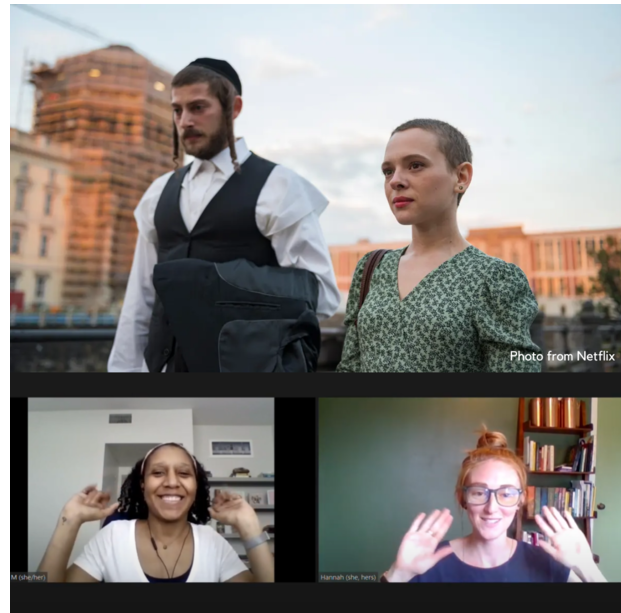




What "Unorthodox" showed us about patriarchy, relationships, and abusive behaviors

In our review, we discuss some of the similarities between what we see in domestic violence work and the main character Esty's experience of leaving her partner and community. We also consider how expectations based in patriarchal values created immense pressure, stress, and pain for Esty, *and* had negative impacts on male characters depicted in the series.

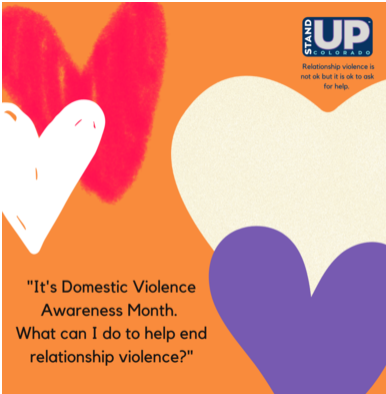

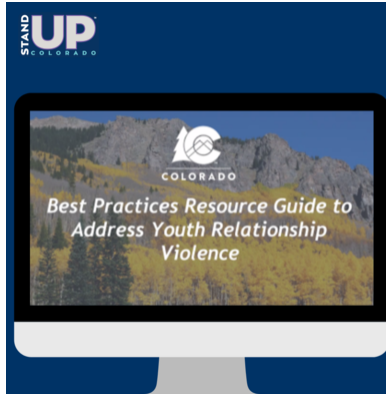
