Budget 2025-2026: What You Need to Know

I would like to bring to your attention a critical issue currently affecting our schools. The Toronto District School Board (TDSB) is facing a projected budget shortfall of \$58 million for the 2025 school year.

Since 2019, funding per student has effectively been reduced by up to \$1,500 annually when adjusted for inflation. This has resulted in over \$340 million in lost funding across the entire system. Compounding this issue, the Financial Accountability Office (FAO) reported in 2024 that the province's share of education spending has dropped significantly—from 24% of the provincial budget in 2019 to just 18% in 2023.

Furthermore, TDSB spends over \$40 million annually to operate schools with very low student populations. This inefficient allocation of limited resources not only drains our budget but also deprives students in these schools of the full range of programming available to those in more populated schools. Despite repeated requests, the provincial government has consistently denied the TDSB's proposals to consolidate these under-enrolled schools.

In response to these financial challenges, TDSB trustees have already made significant budget reductions, totaling tens of millions of dollars, and continue to actively seek additional savings. However, these efforts are limited by provincial obligations and funding restrictions that severely constrain the Board's ability to allocate resources with flexibility.

To manage previous budget deficits, TDSB has reduced central staff and senior administration. Compared to other Ontario school boards, we employ approximately 30% fewer superintendents per school. In line with our commitment to fiscal responsibility, we've already eliminated three superintendent positions, along with their administrative support, to further reduce costs.

Additionally, in the past two years, we've eliminated seven Centrally Assigned Principal positions, while working to preserve direct services and programs for students. The TDSB has also streamlined central administration by cutting over 90 positions, saving approximately \$10 million annually.

The provincial government has decided to send PricewaterhouseCoopers (PwC) to audit TDSB's operations. I welcome this review, as it's essential we receive the support needed to use our funding more effectively. This audit will help ensure every dollar is spent efficiently, maximizing resources for our students' education and enabling us to continue providing the best programs and services.

As we work through this difficult situation, the Board is being forced to make some tough decisions, including potential reductions in staffing and programs. We recognize that these choices could have a direct impact on students, and we are committed to minimizing those effects as much as possible. We continue to strongly advocate for the provincial government to provide the funding our students need and deserve to ensure their success.

We remain focused on safeguarding our students' education and will continue doing everything we can to navigate this challenging financial landscape.

New-Build Funding for TDSB Indigenous Education

The TDSB is advocating for urgent funding to build a new Indigenous Education school, led by the Urban Indigenous Community Advisory Committee. This initiative aims to create an innovative hub for Urban Indigenous Education, accommodating students from Junior Kindergarten to Grade 12, along with a childcare centre. Rooted in Indigenous teachings and community, the new standalone and fully Indigenized building for Kapapamahchakwew - Wandering Spirit School will provide a welcoming and inclusive environment for students across Toronto. This vision honors our commitments to the Truth and Reconciliation Commission of Canada: Calls to Action and the United Nations Declaration on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. Despite persistent efforts, attempts to secure new-build funding through the Ministry of Education's Capital Priorities Program have not yet been successful. The Urban Indigenous Community Advisory Committee and Board of Trustees are requesting transparent and accessible funding that reflects the current construction market and aligns with our commitments to Truth and Reconciliation.

Key Education Priorities for the 2025 Federal Election

With Prime Minister Mark Carney now elected as Canada's next leader, the TDSB is urging the new government to address key education priorities that impact the future of public education. As Canada's largest school board, serving approximately 239,000 students, we highlight four crucial areas: sustainable funding for Indigenous education, the implementation of a national school food program, increased support for childcare spaces, and enhanced resources for newcomer and refugee students. These priorities are essential for the success and well-being of students in Toronto and across Canada. We hope these critical issues will be thoughtfully integrated into the new government's agenda.

TDSB Budget Update

The Toronto District School Board <u>continues to face budget challenges</u> in meeting the needs of our schools and services. While we are committed to using our resources responsibly, the funding from the provincial government is insufficient to meet the needs of Toronto students. We are facing a projected structural deficit of approximately \$58 million for the 2025-26 school year. While <u>a number of options</u> have been brought forward to Trustees for consideration, it's important to note that no final decisions have been made. The Core Education funding for 2025-26 has

yet to be announced and when it is, staff will update the financial projections and inform Trustees.


