The Ronald E. McNair Program works with motivated and talented undergraduates who want to pursue PhDs. Through academic seminars, the program introduces PSU juniors and seniors, who are first-generation and low-income, and/or members of under-represented groups, to academic research and to effective strategies for getting into and graduating from PhD programs. Scholars work closely with faculty mentors on original research projects.

Position summary

The Professional Certificate in Tribal Relations is offered by the Institute for Tribal Government and Center for Public Service in the Mark O. Hatfield School of Government. It is designed for local, state, and federal government agencies, non-profit and for-profit organizations, and trade associations that work regularly with tribal nations and native communities. The program seeks to:

-Foster understanding of tribal perspectives,

-Increase staff effectiveness and accountability when working in Indian Country, and -Improve working relationships between participants and the tribal communities with whom they work.

The Center for Public Service and Institute for Tribal Government need a student program assistant. The position's overall responsibility is to assist participants in the Professional Certificate in Tribal Relations program and program facilitators with logistical and administrative support and to assist in the coordination and delivery of program content.

The Anthropology of Surfing (ANTH 4285/6285, 3 credits). This course introduces students to surfing as a globalizing cultural phenomenon from an ethnographic perspective and focuses on sustainable surf tourism.

Ethnographic Field School in Belize Summer 2019

June 18-July 17, 2019

Community-based research coupled with ethnographic methods training in Belize, an English speaking country in Central America! Experience Belizean culture for one month doing ethnography!

Be a part of a community-based research project on agricultural development within northern Belize farming communities!

Develop skills in ethnographic methods of data collection!

Collaborate on an original ethnographic field report, which may lead to presentations at regional, national and international conferences as well as publications!

In addition to conducting community-based research, students will visit the Belize Zoo, Banquitas House of Culture, Cuello's Distillery, Lamanai Maya Ruins (via boat on the New River), Nohoch Che'en Caves Branch Archaeological Reserve (Cave Tubing), and the Tower Hill (Sugar Cane) Factory.

Base Program Price: \$3,799-\$3,999 (includes ground transportation, accommodations, breakfast, dinner, and excursions; price varies due to early application deadline and optional transcript request, see below for more information)

Group Travel Price: \$699-\$899 (estimated price round-trip air transportation from one of CCSA's designated U.S. departure cities)

Tuition: Waived! Optional transfer credit to another institution, \$100.00 transcript fee (check with your institutional transfer fees, if any).
